5.3 Special Recognition

5.3.1 Murray City Council Employee of the Month, Roger Conder, Murray City Police Officer.

Staff presentation: Brett Hales, City Councilmember  
Craig Burnett, Police Chief

Mr. Hales said the Council started the Employee of the Month a couple of years ago. They felt it was important to be able to recognize the City's employees. He presented Mr. Conder with a certificate, a \$50 gift card and told him his name would appear on the plaque located in the Council Chambers. He expressed his appreciation to Mr. Conder for all he does for the City.

Chief Burnett read a statement from Mr. Conder's supervisors put down when they submitted his name for Employee of the Month:

*"Officer Roger Conder of the Murray City Police Department Motors Division has excelled to a level of exemplary conduct and professionalism in the line of duty. Roger is always polite and courteous; whether it be all of the traffic stops and many citations that he issues, or the variety of patrol calls he handles."*

Chief Burnett said the thing to realize is that as Motor Officers, that is their job; they are writing tickets all of the time and Mr. Conder has had very few, if any, citizen complaints. He is able to deal well with the public. Chief Burnett continued reading the statement:

*"He is a member of the SWAT Team and is very proficient with SWAT tactics and firearm safety. He was appointed a SWAT Squad Leader and is the team's munitions expert."*

*Officer Conder is an expert motorcycle rider and recently won second place among 31 Police Officers from Salt Lake City and Salt Lake County all vying for the highly coveted Harley Davidson annual Skills and Motor Trials."*

Chief Burnett added that the City recently purchased four brand new motorcycles and Mr. Condor was instrumental in specking those out and purchasing them. He made sure they were what the Police Department needed and made sure they were set up the way the department wanted them.

Mr. Condor has been asked to take those motorcycles to other agencies around the State to show how we have put our motorcycles together. He has even found a way to put a rifle rack on the motorcycle. The Murray City Police Department is one of the few in the State where the Motor Officers are also able to carry their AR-15 patrol rifles while they are on a motorcycle.

Chief Burnett stated Mr. Condor is humble and kind. He is respected by those he works with and is somebody that puts on a good face for Murray City and takes care of the citizens. He congratulated Mr. Condor and said the department is proud of him for what he does.

Mr. Hales said it is a great compliment to have someone who is out giving tickets and yet is respected.

5.3.2 Swearing-In new Murray City Police Officers, Bryson Allen, Daniel Rose, Brian Bybee and Andrew Tarkeshian.

Staff presentation: Craig Burnett, Police Chief

Chief Burnett said they have had the privilege of being able to hire four new Police Officers. It is always a good day when they can find some good people to bring into the department and help take care of the citizens of Murray.

Chief Burnett asked the new officers to join him at the podium.

Chief Burnett told a little bit about each of the new officers. He said Mr. Allen was actually a Murray kid and they are proud to have him here. Mr. Allen has been working with the State Prison for about two years. He said that Mr. Rose does not have any law enforcement experience but has served two tours of duty in the United States Marine Corps.

Chief Burnett stated Mr. Bybee has most recently been a Deputy Sheriff with Duchesne County and that Mr. Tarkeshian has most recently been working with the Salt Lake County Sheriff's Office as a Correctional Officer.

Chief Burnett stated they are excited to have the new officers here as part of the Police Department. This helps the City put faces and bodies on the

roads to take care of the citizens the way they have grown accustomed to and the way the City feels they should be taken care of.

The swearing-in ceremony was performed by Jennifer Kennedy.

Chief Burnett asked for the badges to be pinned on the new officers.

- 5.3.3 Swearing-In new Murray City Firefighter, Cameron Willden; Paramedics Ryan Marble and Travis Allred; and promotion of Joe Treadwell to the position of Battalion Chief.

Staff presentation: Gil Rodriguez, Fire Chief

Chief Rodriguez congratulated Mr. Conder. He said Mr. Conder was a pretty stand-up guy last week when the Fire Department needed him. He was a great liaison to them and they appreciate that.

Chief Rodriguez said the Fire Department has been going through a serious transition and they are not done yet. He said this has given the Fire Department the opportunity to hire people. The Fire Department is pretty lucky to still find good, quality people on their list. Tonight there are two Paramedics, a Fire Fighter and a promotion from a Captain to a Battalion Chief.

Chief Rodriguez said first he will talk about the Fire Fighter. He introduced Mr. Willden. He said that it was not always this way, but Mr. Willden comes from a family of Firefighters, whether it was meant to be or not. It is always great when you offer a guy a job and shake his hand and you feel calluses on his hands. Chief Rodriguez told Mr. Willden they are glad to have him as part of the Fire Department family.

Chief Rodriguez introduced Mr. Marble. They stole him from Ogden. He brings some experience and some other talents.

Chief Rodriguez introduced Mr. Allred saying they were glad to have him. He said one thing Mr. Allred told him was that he did ride-alongs from Idaho to Southern Utah and Murray was his favorite place.

The swearing-in ceremony was performed by Jennifer Kennedy.

Chief Rodriguez asked for the badges to be pinned on the new hires. He added that these guys started last Monday and they could not have walked into a bigger firestorm but they were right there with the other members of the Fire Department. They endured it all with class and he appreciates that.

Chief Rodriguez asked the new hires to introduce their families.

Chief Rodriguez introduced Mr. Treadwell who was being promoted from a Captain to a Battalion Chief. Mr. Treadwell has worked in the Fire Department as a Captain for 15 years. Chief Rodriguez said he has worked with a lot of people who have been on the job for a long time, not only in the Fire Department, but in other departments. He said it is very rare that you find a guy that still stays up at night on the internet trying to find out when the next training is going to be. Mr. Treadwell is dedicated to the craft of firefighting and to his people.

Chief Rodriguez said they are glad to have Mr. Treadwell and this promotion is well deserved. He told Mr. Treadwell he appreciates all the hard work he does and for staying passionate with his job.

Chief Rodriguez stated that Mr. Treadwell was instrumental in starting the water rescue program. Not just in Murray, but it pretty much was a catalyst for the water rescue in this part and throughout the state. He congratulated Mr. Treadwell.

The swearing-in ceremony was performed by Jennifer Kennedy.

Mr. Treadwell introduced his family and friends. He said 33 years ago there was a condition that if you were hired as a fireman, you had to live within the boundaries of Murray City. Initially, he felt like he lost his freedom of where he wanted to live. Now that he looks back, that was truly a blessing. He said he has been a part of Murray City since way back when. His children were raised here and go to school here and his wife works here. They are all a part of this incredible community. It is something he is proud of and he is truly honored to serve under great leadership.

Mr. Camp said he remembers being the youngest member of the Fire Department until a year later when Mr. Treadwell was hired. He said Mr. Treadwell has done a wonderful job and congratulated him and all the police and fire new hires and thanked them for their service.

## **8. Public Hearings**

### 8.1 Public Hearing #1

8.1.1 Staff and sponsor presentations and public comment will be given prior to Council action on the following matter:

Consider an Ordinance relating to land use; amends the General Plan from Single-Family Low Density Residential to Single-Family Medium Density Residential and amends the Zoning Map from R-1-8 to R-1-6 for the property located at approximately 6421 South 1300 East. (Alan Kruckenberg Construction)

Staff Presentation: Tim Tingey, Administrative and Development Services Director.

Mr. Tingey said he received an email from the representatives of Kruckenberg Construction today. They requested this item, the rezone request for the property located at approximately 6421 South 1300 East be formally withdrawn.

Frank Nakamura, City Attorney, said that no further action was necessary for this item.

## 8.2 Public Hearing #2

### 8.2.1 Staff and sponsor presentations and public comment will be given prior to Council action on the following matter:

Consider an Ordinance amending the City's Fiscal Year 2014-2015 Budget and approving a donation of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000) to the South Valley Boys and Girls Club.

Staff Presentation: Justin Zollinger, Finance Director.

Mr. Zollinger said the first item in the budget opening is for additional proceeds to go to the Boys and Girls Club. They have requested that the City pay \$120,000 to help support their operations. This money is coming from General Fund reserves.

Mr. Zollinger said the second item is for the Capital Projects Fund. They ran into a slight technical difficulty with some wording that was in State Law that allowed the City to use money for 1300 East. It was also supposed to include language for Vine Street.

The City had gone through the process, received the money and was ready to award the bid out when Doug Hill, Public Services Director, said he was worried there was not correct language in there. He double checked and because of that, we found out the City was not in compliance.

The County really came through on this. They said they would provide some additional funding so the City can do the Vine Street project and then, once we get the language in there, we can reimburse them with this money we receive from the State.

Mr. Zollinger reiterated this is for the Capital Projects fund for \$650,000. He said later on in the year as the law is changed the City will reimburse the County for this money.

Mr. Zollinger said the City has had a land and right-of-way purchase for the Vine and State project. That project was not completely done before the fiscal year end so this is a carry forward. We are carrying forward the budget so the project can be completed. This money will be spent in July and August of 2014 and is a carry forward of \$106,000.

The final item is the same thing only it is for the Redevelopment Agency for \$250,000 for a land and right-of-way purchase.

Mr. Nakamura stated that under Utah Law anytime the City donates money, that is, gives money without value for value; they have to have a Public Hearing. This Public Hearing today regarding the Boys and Girls Club contribution will serve two purposes in that it is also the Public Hearing under State Law for the donation.

Bob Dunn said he met with the Council in the Committee of the Whole right before this meeting and requested the \$120,000. He knows it is a lot of money but he believes this money is beneficial. As he mentioned in Committee of the Whole, the Boys and Girls Club is having kids graduate that may not have made it out and they are keeping out of trouble as well.

#### **Public Hearing Open for Public Comment**

Cathy Johnson – 535 East 6270 South, Murray, Utah

Ms. Johnson introduced her son Dustin. She said the reason they are here is because they wanted to give the Council an idea of the impact that the Boys and Girls Club actually makes in our community.

Ms. Johnson said that most everyone knows about the regular programming that is done at the Boys and Girls Club and a lot of the kids are graduating when there was not an expectation for them to graduate.

She added that there is another side to the Boys and Girls Club that a lot of people may not be aware of, which is where children like Dustin come in. Dustin is deaf and visually impaired. He was born with hydrocephalies which some people call “water on the brain.” Dustin had multiple birth defects.

When Ms. Johnson adopted Dustin he was four years old with the mental level of a six month old. He went to schools for the deaf and blind and there he had many, many therapies and was continuing to grow. The challenge for Ms. Johnson, as a single parent, she had grown up in Murray then moved to Florida and there she was as a foster mother for 10 years. Dustin was the last foster child she had. When she moved back here, it took three more years for him to have termination of parental rights and she was able to adopt him. However, Dustin was still considered deaf and

blind.

The challenge was that Ms. Johnson had to work three jobs. Two were to support herself and her children, pay the mortgage and to pay for other life expenses. The third job was strictly to pay for babysitting because not many people know sign language and are willing to babysit a child with the special health care needs that Dustin had, including seizures.

Ms. Johnson said she was paying over \$10 per hour every hour that she had to leave Dustin and she had to work weekends to do that. This went on until Dustin was old enough to join the Boys and Girls Club in the Juniors Program.

Ms. Johnson said that gave her the opportunity to not only quit one job but also to show how much the Boys and Girls Club can do for children with special needs. Dustin has been the student of the month. The children at the High School go down the halls and give him high fives as he comes down the hall.

Dustin is going to be a junior at Murray High School and Ms. Johnson stated that he is not a little boy anymore. He is thriving and has multiple friends and supporters through the Boys and Girls Club. They gave them a chance and they hired people just because they could sign to help out and keep Dustin going. She thanked the Council for their support of the club saying it was invaluable.

**10. New Business**

- 10.1 Consider a Resolution approving an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement between the City and Salt Lake County to provide for bond proceeds to be transferred to the City to pay for all or part of the costs of City-wide street improvements and resurfacing, and to make other qualified improvements.

Staff presentation: Doug Hill, Public Services Director

Mr. Hill said the Mr. Zollinger summarized this well. This is an Interlocal Agreement with Salt Lake County transferring \$650,000 to Murray City so the City can do an overlay paving on Vine Street between 1000 East and Van Winkle Blvd. In addition, the City will use the money to overlay pave Vine Way, Jeremy Circle and Fontaine Bleu.

Mr. Hill added that the Salt Lake County Council approved this this morning and Mayor Eyre and Ms. Wells were there to represent Murray City. He said he appreciates their help in getting the County to approve these funds.

Mr. Camp thanked Mr. Hill for the work he did on this. He knows it was a little tricky and he appreciates it.

Mr. Hill said the thanks should go to the County for stepping up and helping the City out with this one. He reiterated the City will have to pay this money back and wanted to make sure the Council was aware of that.

- 10.2 Consider a Resolution authorizing the execution of an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement between Murray City School district (“District”) and Murray City (“City”) for shared use of the six new tennis courts at Murray High School.

Staff presentation: Doug Hill, Public Services Director

Mr. Hill said that Murray School District is building six new tennis courts over at Murray High School. They are under construction right now. The School District does not have a need to light those courts and so their plan was to build them without lights. They told the City that if we were willing to pay for the lighting costs that they would allow lights to be installed and the tennis courts could be used by the public during non-school hours. This agreement with the School District formalizes that.

Mr. Hill said the City will pay \$75,000 to the School District to light those six courts. The City will pay the power costs of those lights and will share in the maintenance of those courts going forward. The maintenance would include things like resurfacing the courts and replacing nets. The School District will be responsible for the daily maintenance of the courts. He reiterated the tennis courts will be open to the public for public use during non-school and non-tennis team hours.

Mr. Nicponski asked where the courts are located.

Mr. Hill replied they are located south of the football field in what used to be the old practice field. He added that this money was included in the Power Departments budget so these funds are available.

Ms. Turner asked if the \$75,000 includes the ongoing maintenance that Murray will have to do.

Mr. Hill replied no, it only includes the cost of installation and is a one-time upfront cost. Typically a tennis court, depending on the play, does not need to be resurfaced other than once every 10 to 15 years. It is likely when that happens the City will need to budget funds to resurface these tennis courts.

Ms. Turner verified that the City will be paying the power bill.

Mr. Hill responded yes the City will pay the ongoing power costs. As he understands it, there will be a separate meter that will be in the City's name for the lights and that bill will be paid by the City.

Mr. Hales said that is the City's part to allow the public to use it.

Mr. Hill said that was correct.

Mr. Brass made a motion to approve the Resolution

- 10.3 Consider a Resolution approving an Interlocal Agreement between the City and Cottonwood Heights relating to the City granting an easement across the real property located in the Northwest Quarter of Section 25 Township 2 South, Range 1 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian, Salt Lake County, Utah and Cottonwood Heights agreeing to provide storm water improvements to the City's property.

Staff presentation: Doug Hill, Public Services Director

Mr. Hill said this was discussed in Committee of the Whole a couple of weeks ago. Murray City owns property at the mouth of Big Cottonwood Canyon; approximately 30 acres. This area is a Murray watershed, McGhie Springs, which is one of the major water providers for Murray City. Because it is a watershed, it is undeveloped and the only thing the City has on this property is the springs, wells, and pump houses. Big Cottonwood Creek also runs through this property which makes it a very desirable open space area that falls within the boundaries of Cottonwood Heights.

Mr. Hill stated that Cottonwood Heights has asked Murray City, through this Interlocal Agreement, to donate an easement allowing Cottonwood Heights to continue a trail system through this property. Murray City allowed them to build a trail several years ago and they want to continue to build additional trails in this area.

Mr. Hill said most people don't know that Murray City owns the Park and Ride lot at the base of Big Cottonwood Canyon. The City has a use agreement with Salt Lake County, UTA, and UDOT to use that as a Park and Ride lot. The trail system would start and terminate at this location and they are asking to be able to connect the trail system to the Park and Ride lot.

Mr. Hill continued saying that on the north side of Fort Union Boulevard there is currently a flat dirt area that cars use when the Park and Ride lot is full. Cottonwood Heights would like Murray City to donate approximately 1 ¼ acres of property to them so they can build a formal parking lot that people can park in instead of them pulling off to the side of the road.

Mr. Hill said Murray City told Cottonwood Heights if they are going to use this property for a parking lot and trail system, we need them to make sure the water does not drain off into our property. The City wants it to go into a storm drain system so it can be treated and discharged into Big Cottonwood Creek.

Cottonwood Heights is asking Murray City to donate the land for the storm drain that would be put in on this property.

Mr. Hill stated this agreement allows Cottonwood Heights to use Murray City's property without cost. It is an easement only. We are not selling or giving them the property. It is just an easement. They would use the property for three purposes: a trail, a parking lot and a storm drain system. This is a 10 year agreement and can be renewed annually thereafter if both parties mutually agree.

Mr. Brass verified that Murray City is not donating the property but granting access to it.

Mr. Hill stated that was correct. This is only an easement.

Mr. Hill pointed out a slight problem with the legal description in the agreement. It doesn't substantially change the location of these easements; they are having a problem getting them to close so they can be recorded. He told the Council that if they choose to approve the agreement then they would work with the surveyors to make sure the legal descriptions are accurate.

Mr. Brass asked if the City's watershed and McGhie Springs were adequately protected in this agreement.

Mr. Hill replied he believes they are as long as Cottonwood Heights installs the storm drain because the storm drain will collect all the runoff water. It has been draining onto Murray City's property for years and so this fixes a historical problem as well as any new issues that may arise. The storm drain will provide the protection that Murray City wants.

Mr. Nicponski asked if there was anything that would prohibit Murray to charge for parking on that park and ride lot.

Mr. Hill responded he does not think there would be anything that would prohibit it; the City would just have to amend the agreement or come to some agreement.

Mr. Nakamura said that is subject to a different agreement. The City would have to renegotiate that. He said he does not remember when the termination date for that agreement was.

Mr. Hill said he thinks it is probably about 10 years down the road.

Mr. Nakamura stated it had an open-ended renewal which is the problem with automatic renewals. He said at this time, under that agreement, the answer would be no. However, if we ever have to renegotiate the agreement, then certainly.

**11. Mayor**

11.1 Report

Mayor Eyre extended his appreciation to the Council for all the work they did this evening with regards to the proposals that were presented to them.

Mayor Eyre said that Mr. Zollinger and Mr. Hill did a wonderful job in presenting what happened with the rewording of that agreement with the County. All the work that Mr. Hill did in going over to try and make sure it was appropriated correctly. They did a wonderful job on that.

Mayor Eyre said they attended a workshop today and they were able to ask a lot of questions on this. There were eight of the nine Councilmembers there and many of them had questions about this whole thing. Those questions were all from the staff of the County. He added that Mayor McAdams came into the meeting for that one agenda item and explained it to the Councilmembers and defended the action. If he had not done that, we would have had to explain all that to the County Council. It was an example of the County working with Murray City.

Mayor Eyre stated the Alzheimer's Foundation is having their annual fundraiser walk in Murray Park on September 17, 2014. This incorporates our entire area here. It is a fundraising walk and Mayor Eyre will be the honorary chair of that event. He hopes to get the Council and other businesses and organizations within our community to participate in that.

Mayor Eyre said that on July 9, 2014 he and Mr. Brass had the opportunity to meet with Mr. Tingey and a representative from Woodbury Corporation. They were able to discuss a number of matters regarding going forward with the development of some projects in the downtown area. It was a very productive meeting and another one of the important steps in getting the redevelopment of downtown closer to fruition.

Mayor Eyre said he and some of the Councilmembers had the opportunity to be at the Heritage Center when they recognized 70 volunteers that volunteer throughout the year at the Heritage Center. He said the Heritage Center does a lot of good for our community. There are so many people that volunteer there because they know of the quality of activities that they offer to the senior citizens in our community.

Mayor Eyre stated he received a bunch of phone calls as well as people coming up to him to tell him how wonderful Fun Days, on the Fourth of July, was. He extended his appreciation to the members of the Parks and Recreation staff, the Police and Fire Departments, and everyone else who put their time and effort into the parade and Fun Days activities. It was extremely well received.

Mayor Eyre said that on July 18, 2014 the American Cancer Society will be holding a fundraising event in Murray Park. He, Don Hudson from KSL, and Miss Murray will be thrown in jail. As part of the fundraising activities, people have to offer money as part of their bail to get them out of jail. If they do not receive a certain amount of money, they have to stay in jail. Mayor Eyre said he would really appreciate everyone's help.

Mr. Nicponski said there was an interesting article in the Zion's Bank newsletter that talked about the economic value that arts, recreation and non-profits have when they come into a community. It literally pumps tens of millions of dollars into communities throughout the state. He thinks that any time we can get that type of activity going it really benefits Murray probably more so than what we see.
