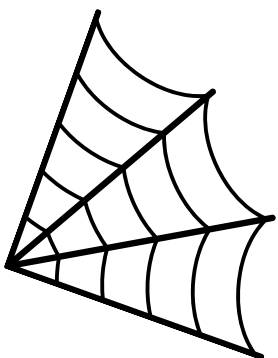
Since this is your chance to entertain (and frighten) an audience, we've gathered some story starts to get your artistic blood flowing. None of these topics are required, they're just spine-tingling ideas to get you thinking.



### Grades 3-6

What happens when...

- An old, dusty film reel shows your future!
- The on-screen characters suddenly step off the screen.
- A ghostly usher guides you to a seat that transports you to another time.
- There's strange music coming from the stage—and nobody's there.
- You and your friends explore the attic and wake the bats.
- Cold and clammy water fills the Theater's basement. And it won't go away... (based on a true story!)
- An old ticket stub grants you a wish. At a chilling cost.
- A long-lost magician returns to perform one final, terrifying trick.
- The grand reopening goes dark mid-show. Only your flashlight and courage can save the audience.
- You sit down, and feel someone already sitting in your seat.
- A glowing green EXIT sign leads you somewhere that's not...an exit.
- A script falls from the balcony, and its story starts to come true.
- The ancient concession manager has never left the building. Ever.



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### Grades 7-12

Build on the story prompts above, give them your own twist, or come up with your own story ideas!

- **Spotlight Terror:** The theater is a place to be seen... until the spotlight starts choosing its own victims.
- **Reel-to-Real:** Old movies are harmless, right? Until the film tears open a portal between fiction and fright.
- **House Left, House Right:** Strange things are happening in the audience. Choose your seat wisely.
- **Beneath the Boards:** Something (or someone) lives under the stage... and they're ready for their comeback.
- **The Echo:** You hear your name called from the balcony. Again. And again. And again.
- **The Flood Below:** Water in the basement has a source. It wants out.
- **The Silent Performance:** No script. No sound. No exit. Can you act your way out?
- **Midnight Matinee:** The theater opens for a special showing—only for those who never left.
