Murray City works very closely with the Utah League of Cities and Towns (ULCT) each year to lobby the legislature and encourage legislation that strengthens local control and the ability of local elected officials to make decisions about local issues that impact our residents. We, along with our fellow ULCT members, strongly oppose state laws that undermine local government. The Executive Director of ULCT, Cameron Diehl, is a local Murray boy! Cameron was part of the Murray City Youth Government in 1999-2000, and we value the wonderful relationship and benefit from his love of his hometown. I agree with the mantra that he reminds us of often, that "government closest to the people governs best."

As a city, we also enjoy very positive working relationships with the State Senators and Representatives who represent Murray. We remain in constant contact with them throughout the legislative session. I encourage all Murray citizens to learn who represents them, both at the State Capitol and at Murray City Hall.
